Key Stages of Careers Planning

Key Stage 3 (Years 7-8)

What You'll Do:

- Begin to explore different careers and industries.
- Understand how the subjects you study in school can help in various jobs.
- Develop personal skills like teamwork, problem-solving, and communication.

What You Can Do Now:

- Start thinking about what subjects and activities interest you the most.
- Talk to family and teachers about different careers and ask them about their experiences.
- Attend careers fairs and events when they are available.

Key Stage 4 (Years 9-11)

What You'll Do:

- Focus on subjects that match your interests and career ideas.
- Begin researching different career options and decide what you might like to do after Year
 11
- Start exploring apprenticeships, college options, and jobs that may require further study or training.

What You Can Do Now:

- Research which careers match your strengths and passions.
- Attend career talks, workshops, and one-to-one careers advice sessions.



• Start gaining work experience if possible (e.g., volunteering, part-time jobs, or work placements).

Post-16 Options

After Year 11, you have several choices, including:

- A-Levels: Academic qualifications that focus on specific subjects and are ideal if you want to
- go to university.
- T-Levels: A technical qualification that combines classroom learning with real-world work
- experience, preparing you for specific careers.
- Apprenticeships: A combination of work and study that allows you to earn while learning,
- often leading to a full-time job.
- Vocational Courses: Practical qualifications that focus on specific trades or skills, helping you
- start a career directly after school.
